She has been recognized for her academic and clinical achievements, including the Resident of the Year Award and the SHARP diploma, and has contributed extensively to research and international academic forums.



AUB's OBS/GYN residents have once again achieved exceptional results in the 2025 CREOG In-Service Training Exam, scoring two standard deviations above the international mean—an achievement that highlights their dedication, rigorous training, and the strength of AUB's OBS/GYN program. Despite the ongoing war and political instability, they remained focused on their medical education, proving their resilience and reinforcing AUB's position as a leading institution for OBS/GYN training among the 17 international and 310 US-based programs that participated in this year's exam.

ACADEMIC NEWS

Dr. Sandrine Atallah was an invited speaker and chair at the European Society for Sexual Medicine (ESSM) 2025 conference, held in Vienna, Austria, on February 20–22, 2025. She contributed to sessions on depression and sexuality, sexual violence in conflict, male hypoactive sexual desire disorder, and psychological counseling for prostate cancer patients. She was also appointed chairperson of the International Society for Sexual Medicine (ISSM) Membership Committee, co-leader of the ISSM–Movember Webinar Series, and mentor for the ISSM Future Leaders Program.

Dr. Faysal El Kak was an invited speaker at the Middle East, North Africa, and Turkey (MENAT) Master Trainers' Forum, that was held in Istanbul, Turkey, in December 2024. He participated as a member of the expert group on human papillomavirus (HPV) prevention in the development process of the Human HPV Policies Atlas for the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region, under the European Policy Forum (EPF), that was held in Riyadh, KSA, in January 2025. He was also appointed associate editor of the Sexual Medicine Reviews Journal for the period from 2025 to 2028 and was selected to serve as a member of the Sexual Health and Well-Being Advisory Group (SWAG) of the World Health Organization (WHO) in Geneva. Finally, Dr. El Kak conducted and facilitated a regional workshop on menopause policy, organized by the WISH program and the Asfari Institute for Civil Society and Citizenship at AUB, on February 27, 2025.

WISH PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

AUB (through the Women's Integrated Sexual Health program [WISH program]) was an invited observer in the Policy and Coordination Committee (PCC) of the UNDP/UNFPA/UNICEF/WHO/World Bank Special Programme of Research, Development, and Research Training in Human Reproduction (HRP), the main arm of WHO work. The meeting, which was held on April 29–30, 2025, at the WHO headquarters in Geneva, included the main funding countries and the main decision-making agencies. This is a testimony of the long standing distinguished relationship between AUB and the WISH program with WHO.

In April 2025, the WISH program launched a campaign to raise awareness about HPV and its link to several cancers, including cervical, throat, and anal cancers.

The WISH program team conducted a coordination meeting with the Ministry of Education and Higher Education and the Ministry of Social Affairs to develop a training and health promotion program targeting students and counselors, as part of the Women's Integrated Sexual Health–Oxford Committee for Famine Relief (WISH–OXFAM) Project.

MEET THE ALUMNI

Dr. Samer Cheaib graduated from AUBMC in 2008 as an OBS/GYN and pursued a subspecialty in Maternal Fetal Medicine (MFM) at Inova Fairfax Hospital in Virginia, USA, completing his fellowship in 2011. During his training and the year that followed, he served as an assistant clinical professor of OBS/GYN at George Washington University School of Medicine (July 2010-June 2012). In 2012, Dr. Cheaib moved to Dubai, where he dedicated his career to advancing MFM. As the director of OBS/GYN and an MFM consultant at Fakih IVF for over a decade, he played a key role in shaping women's healthcare in the region. He was elected as a member of the oral assessment panel for OBS/GYN licensing in Dubai, where he helps evaluate and guide aspiring specialists. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Dr. Cheaib was recognized as the "Ambassador of Hope" after a powerful and heartwarming moment went virala newborn he had just delivered instinctively grabbed his mask and pulled it from his face. That image resonated globally, symbolizing hope and a brighter future beyond the pandemic. While his career has been incredibly fulfilling, his greatest blessing is his family. His wife, Haya, is a pharmacist, and together they have two wonderful children—son Kian, who is two years old, and daughter Sia, who is seven months old. They are his greatest source of joy and inspiration.

DID YOU KNOW?
